Scott Appleby (Ph.D. University of Chicago, 1985) examines the roots of religious violence and the potential of religious peace-building. He directs **Contending Modernities**, a multi-year project to examine the interaction among Catholic, Muslim, and secular forces in the modern world. Among his major publications: Appleby co-authored *Transforming Parish Ministry: The Changing Roles of Clergy, Laity, and Women Religious* (Crossroad, 1989); authored *Church and Age Unite! The Modernist Impulse in American Catholicism* (Notre Dame 1992); co-edited *Being Right: Conservative Catholics in America* (Indiana U Press, 1995); authored *The Ambivalence of the Sacred: Religion, Violence and Reconciliation* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2000), and co-edited with Martin Marty, the five-volume *Fundamentalism Project* (University of Chicago Press).
